WE ARE ONE

One of the largest living organisms on earth is known as Pando (which means “I spread” in Latin). It looks like a forest of quaking aspen trees covering just over 106 acres in Utah’s Fishlake National Forest. But it is actually one individual made up of about 47,000 genetically identical male aspen above-ground stems, and one massive root system weighing over 13 million pounds.

The apostle Paul says in Romans, “though there are many of us, we are one body in Christ, and individually we belong to each other.”

We are one and we belong to each other. We are closer than family in many ways, sharing everything in Christ! In this season of life when we have not been able to be together in person in over 6 months, it can become difficult to grasp the truth that we are one. But, it has never been about what we can understand. It has always been true because of Christ’s overcoming the power of death and separation on the cross and because that is God’s dream for hu-

manity: to know that any separation we perceive is only superficial. In reality, in the truth of what’s unseen, like the roots of Pando, we belong to each other in the deepest sense.

I know many of us are fearful of what the future will hold. We fear how the election will play out, regardless of which side we’re on. We fear what the coming months will hold as Covid-19 presses on in our world. We fear the rise of polarization and hate groups. We fear what climate change is doing to our world. All of these fears hold an element of our own feelings of helplessness. We don’t know what difference we can make in an election other than our own vote. We can’t stop a virus. We aren’t personally involved in a hate group and we certainly don’t know what we can do to stop climate change.

That feeling of helplessness can cause us to freeze and it can cause us to despair. But, as scripture tells us, “Perfect love casts out fear.” 1 John 4:18 That’s not OUR love, which is never perfect. That’s GOD’S love for us and for all people. That God’s love working through us when we are grounded in

spiritual practices and ACT in ways that love God and love our neighbor.

We are all called to resist falling into a petrified state of fear as if someday we'll wake up and everything will magically be better. **Now is our time. Now is what the church was made for, prepared for. This is what we have studied and prayed and worshipped to prepare for – to BE God's church in this time and place.** Now we are called to act, to demonstrate God's love in the reality of this world in all its beauty and its pain.

What does that action look like? It looks like love. Real love – not a feeling. **“Love is not a feeling. Love is to will the good of the other!”**¹ Not waiting until we feel an emotion, we act on the truth of God's love poured out on us through Jesus' life and death and resurrection – trusting that God will use our actions in ways we can't imagine. So those acts of love are everything you do for those you love: acts of caring, spending time with them, reaching out to people knowing many of them are just barely holding on and can't ask for help. But it also looks like reaching out to those people we don't like or don't understand or don't “approve” of because that is always where God calls us as disciples, to the hard places that stretch us.

We “neutralize fear with acts of love despite our feelings.” And since this love is to “will the good of

the other”¹ it is THEIR good that guides us, not what we might want for them. We must be courageous in showing this love, despite the possible consequences and we must be courageous in **receiving the love of others** since giving also means giving others the opportunity to give to us.

Whatever we are feeling, whatever our experience, the answer, the action we are always called to is LOVE because we are one! Because we are all one!

As the weeks and months stretch out in front of us and the uncertainty of our gathering together again weighs upon us, cling to the truth that we are ONE in Christ. As a way to make that reality come to life for each of us we join together in all the ways we can, as often as we can. We worship together on facebook live every Sunday morning at 10. We PRAY for each other, bringing one another's joys and sorrows before our God. We deepen or begin spiritual practices that keep us grounded in the reality that despite our circumstances in this moment, God's love is working in us and in the world to bring God's dream of love for humanity to reality. We encourage each other to acts of love, especially for those we see as ‘other’ or ‘outsider’.

Dear Friends in Christ,

I often wait until my November newsletter to urge people to get out and vote in the coming election. However, this year I am urging you to not wait until November. Rather, first **make sure you are registered to vote, then vote as soon as you receive your mail-in ballot in the mail, and finally, talk to your family members and friends and badger them until they also vote .**

We are at a pivotal time in the history of our nation. While we are probably not all in agreement about what direction we should take, I am sure that we do agree that we are faced with a crucial decision about who our leaders will be. Therefore, it is essential that we all vote. I am grateful that in Washington

State we have a time-tested vote-by-mail system. Yet, it is still very prudent to vote as early as we can so that our vote will be counted, considering that our postal system is inflicted with slow-downs.

Voting is not only a patriotic duty, it is a Christian responsibility and, in fact, a very Lutheran thing to do. These days I have found myself thinking again about Martin Luther's perspective on government and being a citizen. It's important to notice that Luther's views about being a citizen spring out of his then-revolutionary affirmation of “the priesthood of all believers”. In European society in Luther's day, people were viewed as having lives of meaning and worth only if they were “close” to God because of their religious work (nuns, priests and

popes) or because they had high social ranking and power (princes, bankers and emperors.) **In his reading of St. Paul and the Gospels, Luther re-discovered that we are all equally valued and cherished by God, not because of what we do or who we are socially, but because God unconditionally loves and prizes each one of us.** Luther then went on to say that, just as we are all equally loved by God, so we are also given lives of equal meaning and purpose. **From the first moment of our baptism, we all become priests, called and empowered to serve and care for others as God has cared for us.**

The exact form of our priesthood depends on the context of our lives and what we are specifically called to do, our vocation. Luther used the term “office” to describe the different vocations we take on. We might use the term “role”. We live out our priestly faith in the variety of offices and roles we play in our lives: parent, computer programmer, farmer, nurse, pastor. And, yes, the “office” of both citizen and elected leader are among the roles that Luther identifies as part of God’s royal priesthood.

Luther was still very much shaped by the sixteenth century society around him that was just emerging from feudalism. Therefore, he did not leap immediately into full-scale democracy. However, the rights and duties that he proposes for common people and their government leaders are quite stunning. As cities in Germany became “Lutheran”, they welcomed advice from Luther about how to re-form their government structures so that they would better reflect God’s equal, life-changing love. In response, for the first time in Europe’s history, Luther mobilized local governments to: (1) Establish and financially support free schools open to all boys and girls. (2) Establish a social assistance program that would provide material help to people in crisis (widows, the ill, the unemployed.) This welfare program or “community chest” would be equally administered

by a balanced leadership group of two nobles, two city council leaders, three town citizens and three peasant farmers. **Democracy was truly emerging out of Luther’s re-discovery of the priesthood of all believers!** (*See the two books listed at the end of this letter that explain Luther’s teaching about government more fully.)

Reading Luther has encouraged me to see again how the office of being a citizen is a holy calling and part of our priesthood as God’s people. In the same way that parents care for children, **God is working through us as citizens to care for our nation and the world and to bring safety, adequate food, fair wages, education, healthcare, and justice to all people, regardless of color or language. That is God’s vision and will for us.**

So, Luther would say to us, VOTE! Tell everybody you know to vote! Then after you vote, get involved in local projects that improve your community. Finally, after the elections take place, we will also have an important ministry of healing and reconciliation to do. So much anger, bitterness and violence has been unleashed during the past four years. Therefore, our ministry as citizens must include bringing people together and rebuilding a sense of community, even as we make complicated decisions as a nation.

May God bless and guide us as we enter a new four-year chapter in our journey together as a nation.

HEALTHY COMMUNICATION IN TOUGH TIMES

Healthy communication is important in the best of times. Throw in a pandemic and political turmoil and things can get messy. In the church we are especially careful to express our love for each other and for all our neighbors by practicing healthy communication skills. Some basics that are helpful in all relationships include the following.

- Everyone speaks for themselves. Each of us needs to take responsibility for expressing our own feelings or concerns.
- When there is a concern, we go directly to the

person involved. Honest, direct, loving communication is the basis of all healthy relationships.

- If the concern is not resolved after direct communication, we ask a neutral person to join us in that conversation for the sake of understanding and healing.
- We avoid triangulation. Triangulation occurs when one person does not communicate directly with another person, instead using a third person to relay communication to the second. Triangulation distorts relationships and makes clear communication difficult.
- We pray for each other trusting that God loves us all and in prayer can heal our hurts and restore relationships.

COUNCIL MEETING CHANGES

As we continue to adapt to a changing world, your church council has found new ways to meet and continue its' work, concisely stated as: ensuring that **“the purpose of the church is fulfilled (Love God and Love Neighbor) and managing the property and finances of the congregation so that purpose #1 can be fulfilled.”**

We have found Zoom meetings to be useful but exhausting and challenging. So, we divided the work of council into two parts: Mission and Administration. The first council meeting each month, on the second Tuesday we focus on the mission of the church., hearing reports from ministry leaders and addressing mission needs. The second council meeting each month, on the fourth Tuesday focuses on administrative responsibilities, including financial, hearing reports from the treasurer and financial secretary. Each meeting is scheduled to last one hour. We do our best to stay within that hour, honoring the reality of the stress and exhaustion many of us are feeling during this time.

In addition to those changes we do as much of the work ahead of time as possible, communicating via email, submitting reports far in advance so there is time for questions to be answered before we meet.

As has always been the case, congregation members are invited to join council meetings. If you have an agenda item you want included at the meeting or if you would like to sit in on a meeting, send those requests to council president, Joelle Buckman. She can be reached at: joelle_buckman@email.com or 360.589.6111.

Please submit those requests far enough in advance that she can determine at which meeting they would be most appropriate.

Zoom meetings require a link which must be kept secure to avoid being “zoom bombed.” (I know! For every

new technology there a new way to make things difficult. Zoom bombing is when unwanted people join the meeting sometimes flooding it with inappropriate or disturbing photos or video.) Joelle will provide you with that link so you can join the meeting. There will be time at the end for you to comment if you wish to do that. Council members are always available to answer questions. Their contact information is at the end of this newsletter.

Please pray for your church leadership, including Pastor Val. These times are challenging for all of us. The leadership of the church feels that challenge personally as well as the need to faithfully listen to God's Spirit leading the church into an unknown future.

-The Chaplains dinner is happening every Sunday. Amy has been in contact with Rev. Sarah about how it has been going. There is a group (Mike, Dee, Rabungs, Carmon, Johnstones and Hildreths) from Amazing Grace that will be cooking for the Chaplain's Dinner on Sept 13th.
 4. God's Work Our Hands- Amy will come up with an event in the coming months or six weeks.
- C. PSALM report – Joelle & Pastor Val



